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Show Me the Money!

Introduction

Students will think about the factors that impact how much a worker earns at a job. Students will list those factors in a web chart. Then, students will asked to determine whether the factors that determine a worker's wage are acceptable or not.

Learning Objectives

• Students will identify and describe the factors that influence the earnings of workers in the workplace.

Materials Needed

Notebook paper

Procedure

- Ask students to raise their hands if they have a job. For those students, ask if they feel as though they are paid
 enough to perform their job duties and responsibilities. If they feel they are underpaid, ask students to explain
 why. Spend a few minutes discussing student responses as a class. From there, inform students that there are
 many factors that determine how much someone makes at a job. (For instance: Someone working as a cashier
 will not make as much money as a doctor, because the job requirements for the doctor are much greater.)
- 2. Construct a web chart on the board. Ask students to complete the web chart on a piece of paper. In the middle of the web chart, write "factors that influence earnings." Allow students to contribute to the discussion while filling in the web chart. Responses may vary and might include: education, gender, previous experience, etc.
- 3. Students will be asked to respond to this question on notebook paper: Are the factors that influence a worker's earnings fair and acceptable? Why or why not? Responses must be constructed in 5-paragraph form. All opinions must be supported with evidence.
